# Executive Summary

## Overview:

The NGO Education Partnership (NEP) serves as the primary national umbrella organization for civil society actors dedicated to enhancing the education landscape in Cambodia. With a membership exceeding 100 organizations, NEP facilitates vital policy dialogue and cooperation among stakeholders to ensure inclusive, high-quality education and lifelong learning for all Cambodians.

## Strategic Impact and Governance

In 2025, NEP's strategic focus centered on grassroots empowerment and strengthening provincial coordination. The organization successfully managed six Thematic Working Groups (TWGs) covering critical areas such as Early Childhood Care, Primary Education, Inclusive Education, and Teacher Development. To bolster leadership, NEP convened three Education Champion Leader Meetings (ECLM), each drawing participation from around 70 NGOs to address equity, gender responsiveness, and education financing.

## Future Outlook

Despite these successes, challenges in strategic alignment and resource mobilization persist. Moving forward, NEP remains committed to generating evidence-based advocacy and strengthening the solidarity of the civil society network to influence meaningful educational reform in Cambodia.

## Key Achievements

- **National Advocacy:** The 7th National Conference, themed "Projecting the Education Outlook: Reimagining the Future, Together," gathered 252 participants from 171 organizations, including government ministries, to discuss school reform and dropout challenges.
- **Digital Engagement:** NEP hosted 11 EduNetTalk online shows with more than 52,4000 views, fostering dialogue on student learning outcomes and parent engagement.
- **Resource Accessibility:** The NEP Policy Bank reached a milestone of 321 documents with 1,265 downloads, providing essential evidence for informed decision-making.
- **Membership Reach:** Our network includes 73 local NGOs and 45 international NGOs operating across all 25 provinces.

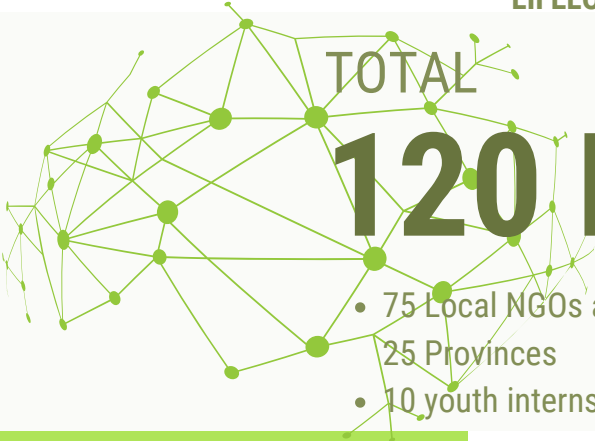

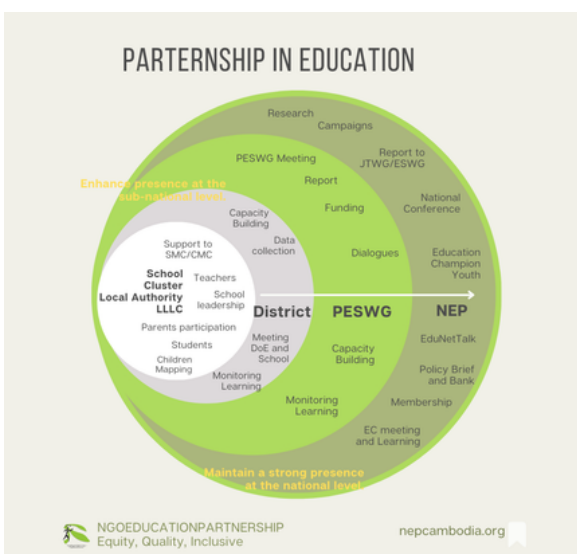


# VISION & MISSION

NEP advocates for NGOs in the education sector, aiming for equal access to high-quality education for all Cambodians through active participation in policy discussions and advocacy initiatives.

# OUR ACHIEVEMENTS



## MEMBERSHIPS

Across 25 provinces, 75 local NGOs and 45 international NGOs formed a robust partnership, working tirelessly to make a difference through shared knowledge and learning. Meanwhile, 10 eager youth interns embarked on their journey at NEP, fully prepared to learn from these collaborations and contribute to joint evidence-based advocacy efforts.



## TRAININGS & LEARNING

The learning session on Gender Programming was provided by CARE Cambodia. The session was open not only to NEP members but also to the NEP team, ensuring broader participation and capacity building within the organization.

The support was delivered as an online learning session, combining interactive presentations and discussions to enhance understanding of gender-responsive programming.

The learning session focused on strengthening capacity in Monitoring & Evaluation (M&E), Policy Briefs development, and Advocacy Strategy. Participants gained practical knowledge and skills to integrate gender considerations into evidence-based advocacy and program design.

## > POLICY BANK

Policy Documents uploaded: 321 documents, 1,265 downloads, and countless hours of dedicated research have culminated in a comprehensive repository of knowledge. This policy bank serves as a crucial resource for stakeholders, enabling informed decision-making and fostering an environment of transparency and accountability. As we continue to expand our collection, we remain focused on providing tools that empower communities and enhance educational outcomes across the regions we serve.

# OUR ACHIEVEMENTS



## SIX THEMATIC WORKING GROUPS

The NGO Education Partnership (NEP) is the national umbrella organization for civil society actors focused on improving education in Cambodia. Its Thematic Working Groups (TWGs) address specific education areas, including early childhood care, primary education, inclusive education, non-formal education, teacher development, and school reform. Despite increased engagement, challenges in coordination, policy awareness, and strategic alignment hinder effective advocacy and resource mobilization. As of 2025, six TWGs are active:

- Network of Early Childhood Care and Development
- Primary Education Working Group
- Non-Formal Education and Lifelong Learning Working Group
- Working Group on Education and Disability
- Teacher Development Working Group
- School Reform Working Group.



## PROVINCIAL EDUCATION SECTOR WORKING GROUPS



Investing in Provincial Education Sector Working Groups (PESWG) boosts educational accountability and includes marginalized voices in policy discussions. This support produces quality evidence for decision-making, aiding Cambodia's education reforms and SDG4 commitment.

Objectives: (1) Strengthen P-ESWG ownership and functionality (2) Enhance collaboration among NGOs, government, and the private sector (3) Improve monitoring and evidence through visits and reports on equity and outcomes (4) Build PESWG member capacity for lifelong learning.

The initiative involves twelve Provincial Education Sector Working Groups: Kampong Speu, Kampong Thom, Siem Reap, Battambang, Kampot, Takeo, Prey Veng, Svay Rieng, Kampong Cham, Kratie, Mondulhiri, and Rattanakiri.

# OUR ACHIEVEMENTS



## EDUCATION CHAMPION LEADER MEETING

The Education Champion Leader Meeting (ECLM) is a national quarterly event for chairs and vice chairs of P-ESWGs and thematic working group members. It facilitates mutual support, sharing best practices, networking, and strengthening capacities within the Cambodian education sector. In 2024, ECLM will focus on key issues like equity, quality, inclusion, gender responsiveness, and education financing, aiming to enhance collaboration and policy dialogue. In 2025, **three ECLMs were held** with participation from 70 NGOs at each meeting.



## EduNetTalk



The EduNetTalk is a monthly online talk show by the NGO Education Partnership (NEP) launched in 2021 to foster dialogue, learning, and advocacy in Cambodia's education sector. It engages various stakeholders, including government officials, educators, and researchers, to discuss critical themes, research, policies, and challenges in education. The series is hosted live on Zoom and streamed on NEP's Facebook page, allowing viewers to participate by asking questions during the discussions.

In 2025, NEP hosted **11 EduNetTalks**. The following topics were covered: PLP to improve student learning outcomes, Promoting Gender and Inclusion to Improve Student Learning Outcomes, Strengthening community and parents' engagement to improve learning outcomes, Disability and Inclusion: Disability does not limit Educational Opportunities, Education in Emergency,





# NATIONAL CONFERENCE

As Cambodia evolves due to technological changes, demographic shifts, and global disruptions, its education system must also adapt. The NGO Education Partnership (NEP) organizes an annual conference to address these challenges and prepare for the future. Following the 6th National Conference in April 2025 (195 participants, 72 female, from 89 organizations), the 7th National Conference in September 2025 focused on "Transforming the Education Paradigm" with the theme "Projecting the Education



Outlook: Reimagining the Future, Together." It gathered 252 participants, including 117 females, from 171 organizations, such as various government ministries, civil society, and education stakeholders, to discuss key issues like inclusive education, dropout challenges, and community engagement.

# OUR ACHIEVEMENTS

## > MEETINGS

Throughout the year, we actively participated in a series of significant meetings and workshops that broadened my understanding of various initiatives. We attended six Education Sector Working Group meetings, all led by UNICEF, where pivotal discussions and strategies were shared. Additionally, we joined a Joint Technical Working Group meeting, which provided valuable insights and collaboration opportunities with MoEYS and Development Partners. Our engagement extended further as we participated in 17 Ministry and Partner Consultations Workshops, each offering a platform to exchange ideas and foster partnerships.

## > INCLUSIVE EDUCATION CAMPAIGN

The "Disability Does Not Limit Educational Opportunities" campaign promotes inclusive education in Cambodia, focusing on students with disabilities, girls, and ethnic minorities. As part of Cambodia's 2050 vision for human capital development, the campaign aims to ensure all students have access to quality, gender-responsive education. Funded by the Partnership for Education (GPE) through Oxfam Denmark and other donors, it seeks to amplify marginalized voices and mobilize community advocacy for systemic improvements. # OUR ACHIEVEMENTS

## YOUTH EDUCATION CHAMPION

Youth Champions serve as trusted messengers within their communities while developing the skills, knowledge, and networks needed to engage effectively with education stakeholders and policymakers. This approach recognizes that sustainable change requires both grassroots awareness and evidence-based policy influence.

The Youth Education Champion will receive a certification upon completing the internship, which will be valid for two years. Champions may reapply for certification by providing evidence of actions taken to address education issues or advocate for change. These actions may include, but are not limited to, supporting marginalized students' access to school, preventing dropouts, fundraising for schools, and similar initiatives. Advocacy efforts can involve actively engaging in policy dialogue and raising awareness within communities.



## GREENSPOTS PROJECT

The Greenspots: Climate-Resilient Schools Project, initiated by the NGO Education Partnership (NEP) and TDSO and partner with local implementing partners which are members of NEP. This initiative seeks to strengthen public primary toward resilient to climate change through three interconnected pillars: infrastructure enhancement (Pillar 1), STEM and teacher capacity building (Pillar 2), and community engagement (Pillar 3).

From January to July 2025, significant progress has been made in implementing Pillar 1 activities, with five Miyawaki forests established across two provinces, featuring a total of **2,338 trees**. Protective fences and pumping watering systems have been put in place to ensure these forests thrive. The project has seen enthusiastic participation from a variety of stakeholders, with a total of **1,226 individuals joining the tiny forest planting** events across all five schools.

# PROVINCIAL-ESWG TESTIMONIALS



Kampot P-ESWG was established under the initiative of NEP and has received continuous support from NEP over many years to enable the group to function effectively. In 2025, NEP still supported the quarterly meetings of the Kampot P-ESWG, allowing the group to continue discussing and addressing key issues and challenges in education in Kampot province. NEP has also provided technical input and advice during these discussions, such as support in identifying and measuring primary school dropout rates..etc.

In addition, NEP has supported the management of the Kampot ESGW to participate in the quarterly ECLM (Education Champion Leader Meeting). This is an important national-level meeting where ESGWs from all provinces and cities, together with education practitioners across Cambodia, come together to share experiences and achievements in implementing education activities, as well as to jointly discuss challenges. Kampot has raised key issues for discussion in three priority areas: the inclusive education, school health, implementation of model school standards, and dropout rates at both primary and secondary levels.

These important issues were not only discussed at the ECLM but were also brought to the annual NEP Education National Forum, with NEP's support. The outcomes and challenges identified were presented as key inputs to the Ministry of Education, Youth and Sports, contributing to national-level dialogue on improving the education sector in Cambodia. As a result, various education policies and reforms have been introduced, leading to continuous improvements in the education system year by year.

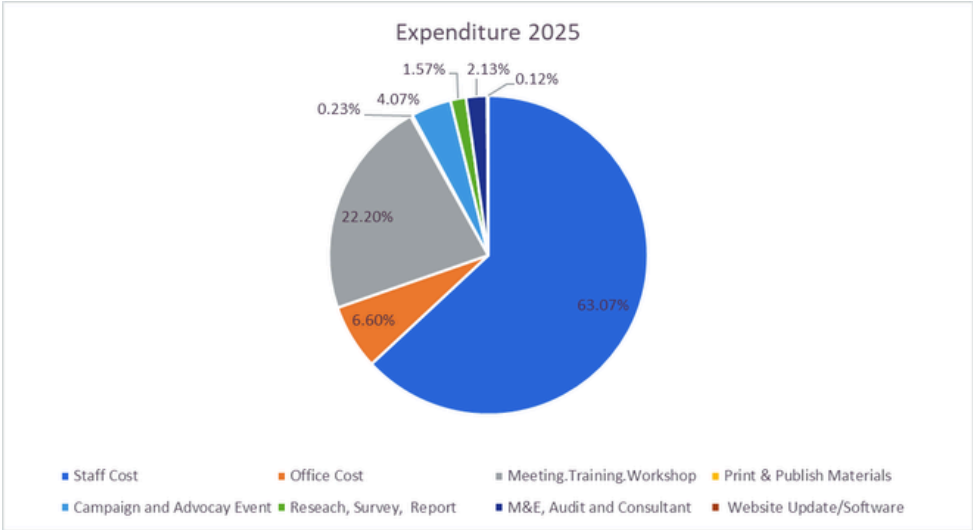
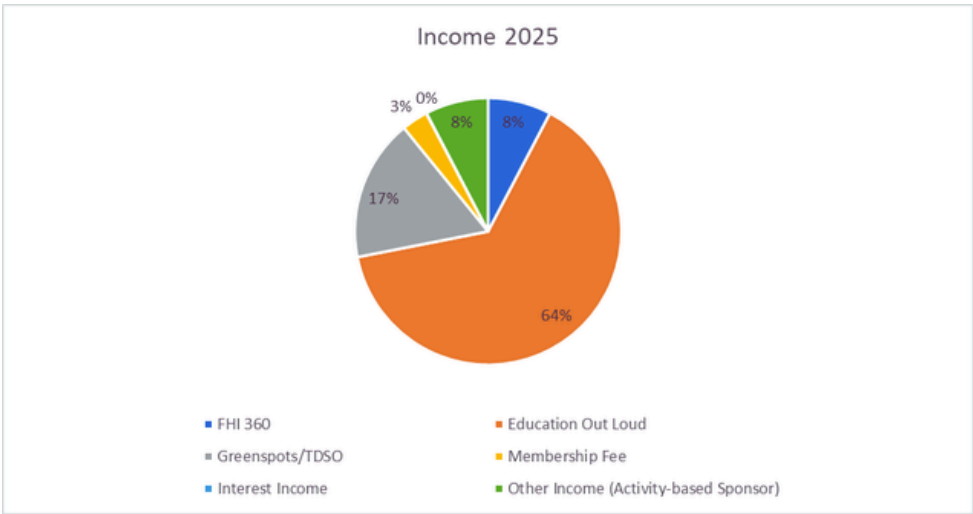
